Are you someone still fascinated with the massive preparations for WWII D-Day? Have you ever experienced gender bias...especially in the military? Would you like a new and different way to celebrate Veterans Day?

If the answer is yes to any of these then we invite you to a Fundraiser Theatre Portrayal sponsored by the local Sun City Center/SouthShore Branch of AAUW (American Association of University Women). Maureen Patrick will present a Living History Presentation about the life of an American Red Cross Field Director in WWII Britain. In authentic uniform this Tampa actor will take you back to a little-known aspect of D-Day: the deployment of hundreds of American Red Cross workers to Great Britain to prepare for the invasion. She is a real 1940's woman who had to cope with shortages, gender bias, unpredictable living arrangements, civilian resentment of the Yank 'occupation' as well as the daily horrors of a country already under siege. She makes it so real you will almost hear the air raid sirens wailing!

About Our Program Presenter..

Maureen Patrick is a Florida native and holds an M.L.A. from the University of South Florida. She is the former Curator/Education Curator of the Ybor City Museum, the Past President (15 years) of Tampa Historical Society, Inc., and a 21-year staffer at the Henry B. Plant Museum (Tampa) where she created and was Lead in a popular museum theater program. An accomplished writer, Maureen was Editor of *The Sunland Tribune* (an academic journal of local history) for 10 years and has published numerous articles in cultural history for both scholarly and popular publications. Maureen is also a seasoned veteran of the stage, with 17 years as a dancer/actor at Walt Disney World (Orlando), two Department of Defense tours with her own performance ensemble, and bookings in the U.S., Canada, and Europe. Now 'semi-retired', Maureen brings her unique blend of drama, humor, and scholarship to lectures, walking tours, and historical reenactment.

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Tech Trek 2020 Accepting Nominations

In pursuit of our stated mission to support girls' education and STEM initiatives in South Shore, we are working again this year with Beth Shields Middle School to identify 7th grade girls who demonstrate an aptitude for math and science. Each school may nominate up to five girls for Florida Tech Trek 2020, planned for next June on the campuses of FAU-Jupiter and Stetson-Deland. Each camp will again host 48 STEM-oriented campers.

The deadline for teacher nominations – entered directly online – is December 1. Florida Tech Trek will then send an application directly to each girl. Girls will have until January 15 to enter their applications directly online. Our STEM Committee will then interview each local candidate in February.

These excellent STEM camps are free to campers. The cost of \$1,100 per girl for the 7-day residential camp is supported by donations from generous individuals and corporations across Florida.

A Trivia Question for You

QUESTION: Who was the first female candidate to run for the US presidency?



ANSWER: Victoria Woodhull.

She was a woman 100 years ahead of her time, running for President of the United States in 1872. Woodhull was nominated for President by the newly formed Equal Rights Party on May 10, 1872 in New York City.

Although laws prohibited women from voting, there was nothing stopping women from running for office. Frederick Douglass, the famed civil rights activist, was nominated to be her Vice President, though he never acknowledged or accepted the nomination publicly.

A FEW THINGS ABOUT CURIE

On April 20, 1902, scientist Marie Curie isolated the element radium while researching pitchblende, and it won her a Nobel Prize for her work in the new area of radioactivity.

Here are a few things you never knew about Marie Curie...



It was a struggle for Curie to complete her education. Marie Curie, born Maria Salomea Sklodowska, grew up in Poland and wanted to attend the University of Warsaw along with Bronia, her sister. However, the university did not allow women to enroll, so they both attended the Flying University, which did allow females. Because it was illegal at that time for women to attend higher institutions of learning, the school changed locations often to avoid being discovered by authorities.

Most of Curie's work was performed in a shed that was behind a school where her husband. Pierre, worked.

She won Nobel Prizes in two different sciences. Curie won a Nobel Prize for physics in 1903, along with her French physicist husband, Pierre, and physicist Henri Becquerel for the advances they had made in the subject of radioactivity.

In 1911, Curie won a second Nobel Prize in the category of chemistry for her discovery of the elements polonium and radium.

Madam Curie is the <u>only</u> person to have ever received Nobel Prizes in two different sciences.

She tried to donate her two Nobel Prize medals to melt down for the war effort. The offer was refused, so she donated the money instead.
